The OFRPC was designated by the Governor of the State of Missouri in 1967 under Missouri's State and Regional Planning and Community Development Act.





#### foundation

The Ozark Foothills Regional Community Foundation (OFRCF), established in 2011 as the charitable arm of the Ozark Foothills Regional Planning Commission, is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life for current & future residents. By reinvesting in the five counties & sixteen cities within our region, the Foundation has built a lasting legacy of community investment & impact. As of the close of the fiscal year in June 2025, OFRCF reported a balance of

\$3,185,469.58 and has awarded more than \$2,003,221.78 in grants since its establishment.

At the heart of this work is the **Ozark Foothills Regional Endowment Fund,** managed under the Foundation's umbrella. The endowment is overseen by a nine-member board of directors, chaired by Russell French, and provides annual grant awards that are reinvested directly into the local community.





### development

The Ozark Foothills Development Association is an IRS-defined nonprofit charged with enhancing economic development in the five county region. The association administers the Ozark Foothills Business Incubator.

The Small Business Incubator, constructed in 1988 and expanded in 2018, provides 30,000 square feet of affordable operating space to start-up or expanding enterprises.

During FY2025, the Ozark Foothills Development Association maintained **94%** 

occupancy within its original 7-unit incubator space and 73% within the 4-unit expansion area .

# recycling

The Ozark Foothills Solid Waste Management District, Region Q and

Ozark Foothills Regional Planning Commission, in partnership with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, funds the Ozark Foothills Materials Recovery Facility (Recycling Center). In doing so, it provides region-wide recycling services to Butler, Carter, Reynolds, Ripley and Wayne Counties. During FY 2025, the


Ozark Foothills Recycling Center diverted **782.39** tons of aluminum, tin, plastic, cardboard, newspaper, white paper, white goods, tires and magazines from landfills.

### housing

The Ripley County Public Housing Agency is authorized to provide

HUD Section 8 rental and, if applicable, utility subsidies to 476 families

throughout the five-county service area. As of June 30, 2025, there were 56

families enrolled in the agency's Family Self-Sufficiency and 8 families enrolled in

Homeownership Programs, while **397** families were receiving Section 8 rental assistance.



### transportation

The **Ozark Foothills Transportation Advisory Committee** (TAC) consists of 30 members, including a multi-modal member from each county, who meet quarterly to identify, discuss and prioritize the region's transportation needs. Prioritized needs are relayed to MoDOT for potential inclusion within the five-year Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), which is updated annually.

# Ozark Foothills Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) FY2025 REGIONAL PROJECT PRIORITIES

- 1. Widen shoulder on Highway 106 in Reynolds County
- 2. Highway 34 East of CR236 approximately 300 yards, small bridge replacement over Gizzard Creek in Wayne County
- 3. Turning lane, west bound Highway 60 at both Business 60 and James Street in Van Buren in Carter County
- 4. (*Tie*) 4-lane Highway 67 from Highway 160 to the state line in Butler County & Highway 21 South at Briar Creek Bridge Replacement in Ripley County
