The OFRPC was designated by the Governor of the State of Missouri in 1967 under Missouri's State and Regional Planning and Community Development Act.



The Ozark Foothills Regional Planning Commission (OFRPC) manages its internal activities, as well as the activities of the Ozark Foothills Development Association, the Ozark Foothills Regional Community Foundation, the Ozark Foothills Solid Waste Management District and the Ripley County Public Housing Agency.









The OFRPC's core service is providing grant preparation and administrative services to its five member counties and 16 member cities. During Fiscal Year 2024, OFRPC staff prepared

33 grant applications and brought \$6,082,210 in grant awards into the Ozark Foothills Region.

foundation

The **Ozark Foothills Regional Community Foundation**, established in November 2011, is the charitable arm of the Ozark Foothills Regional Planning Commission.

The mission of the Foundation is to establish endowments
that enhance the quality of life for current and future
generations by reinvesting in the five counties and 16 cities of
the Ozark Foothills Region of Missouri.

The foundations 11-member Board of Governors is led by Russell French, chairman; secretary and treasurer vacant.

As of June 2024, the Foundation held funds with total assets valued at \$2,843,275





development

The Ozark Foothills Development Association is an IRS-defined nonprofit charged with enhancing economic development in the five county region. The association administers the **Ozark Foothills Business Incubator**.

The Small Business Incubator, constructed in 1988 and expanded in 2018, provides 30,000 square feet of affordable operating space to start-up or expanding enterprises. During FY 2024, the Ozark Foothills Development Association maintained 100% occupancy within its original 7-unit incubator space and 50% within the 4-unit expansion area.

The **Ozark Foothills Solid Waste Management District**, Region Q, in partnership with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, funds the Ozark Foothills Materials Recovery Facility, the Recycling Center. In doing so, it provides region-wide recycling services to Butler, Carter, Reynolds, Ripley and Wayne Counties. During FY 2024, the Ozark Foothills Recycling Center diverted **589.44** tons of aluminum, tin, plastic, cardboard, newspaper, white paper, white goods, tires and magazines from landfills.









- 1. Highway 21 South at Briar Creek Bridge Replacement in Ripley County.
- 2. 4-lane Highway 67 from Highway 160 to the state line in Butler County.
- 3. Highway 34 East of CR236 approximately 300 yards, small bridge replacement over Gizzard Creek in Wayne County.
- 4. Safety Shoulders on Highway 49 from Highway 67 to Mill Spring and Piedmont to Iron widen existing box culverts in Wayne County.
- 5. Highway F bridge/low water crossing flooding in Reynolds County.
- 6. Highway 160 repair poor construction in Ripley County.
